Message from our **CEO & BOARD CHAIR**

Over the past 16 years, Dallas Afterschool has built an ecosystem of safe, high-quality, and enriching childcare programs that are free or low-cost. We keep kids safe, advocate for affordable childcare, provide workforce development, help families find programs, and lead the sector with training, communication, and support for programs. We have grown from working with just 25 sites to now supporting 232 sites, training 1,700 childcare professionals, and positively impacting over 17,000 children.

Despite all of our progress, however, the expiration of covid recovery funding in the spring of 2024 is threatening childcare programs, leaving many at risk of closing their doors. In Dallas County, there are over 157,000 families living in poverty, including over 30,000 single mothers who depend on safe, enriching childcare. Now more than ever, our work is critical to our community, and so is your support.

We hope you find our annual report informative, providing greater insight into our mission and work. We also hope it might inspire you to continue investing in a better future for all families in Dallas.


Despite the great value of these programs, many people are surprised to learn that in Texas free and low-cost afterschool programs (*for children ages 5 and up*) are exempt from any licensing requirements. Most of these programs operate without assistance or oversight and often on a shoestring budget, which is why Dallas Afterschool was established - to keep children safe and to provide leadership and support for childcare programs and their staff.

Closing the Opportunity Gap for **CHILDREN**

Over the years we have proved our theory of change that high quality childcare programs contribute to greater student academic achievement. Through an independent study, the Student Outcomes Project, we found that **students in our affiliated programs outperform their peers on state tests in math and reading, while early learners have greater literacy gains than those not in high-quality programs** (SMU Center on Research and Evaluation, 2016). Our high-impact tutoring and summer literacy support for students help further reinforce these gains.

WONDER KITS®:

Fun, interactive, hands-on STEM activity boxes designed to "inspire curiosity." Our Lunar Landers kit (pictured left) is a student favorite that helps teach the concepts of speed and velocity.

VIRTUAL REALITY:

CALM KITS:

Activities and manipulatives that help children manage their emotions, such as breathing exercises, daily journals, fidget toys, mood meters, and more.

Technology that offers unique opportunities for immersive, hands-on learning experiences to enhance childrens' understanding, skills, and readiness for the future. Students can explore the Egyptian pyramids, snorkel in the Great Barrier Reef, tour college campuses, and more.


Each year, Dallas Afterschool assists thousands of caregivers and parents, like Akilah, who rely on quality childcare programming to maintain full-time employment or finish out the workday. Our online **Afterschool Locator** tool helps families locate programming near their home or work, and they can further narrow their search by type of program, times offered, or by grade level.

Parent engagement is vital for high quality programming. Our team hosts trainings for both parents and for our partner programs to ensure families and caregivers have the tools they need to advocate for childrens' needs.

Creating a Better Future for our COMMUNITY

Our **Afterschool Landscape Tool** is an additional resource that helps community leaders and elected officials understand where afterschool and summer programs are needed most. This online and up-to-date resource allows users to visualize supply and demand scores for each census tract. This is one way our community leaders can stay informed and take action.

We also mobilize community members and advocate for free and low-cost childcare at the city and schooldistrict levels. Our team attends neighborhood and City Council meetings and shares updates with local families, community partners, and the general public on important opportunities to make their voices heard. One example is the City of Dallas' consolidated budgeting process and how we highlight the importance of providing commentary and supporting public funding for Dallas Park and Recreation afterschool programs.

Leading the Childcare SECTOR

The largest risk facing the childcare sector is the ongoing labor shortage. According to a recent study conducted by Afterschool Alliance, staffing issues are among the most common challenges reported by Dallas providers, with over 62 percent reporting that they are "very concerned" or "extremely concerned" about finding staff to hire or staffing shortages. Maintaining adequate staff was a reported concern by 55 percent of programs surveyed.

Dallas Afterschool proactively addressed the labor shortage by creating a staffing service, the **Early Childhood | Out-of-School Time Workforce Development Program**, that provides trained, vetted staff, while offering these same staff benefits, living wages, and career and college pathways. Over the past four years, we have placed over 400 staff in the sector with retention rates well above average. By offering incentives like retention bonuses and tuition reimbursement, we are able to keep more professionals in the sector and help them grow. Our investment in **"the workforce behind the workforce"** is just one way we are leading the childcare sector.



We also support the sector through resource coordination. Dallas Afterschool was awarded funding from **The City of Dallas** to help the sector recover from the effects of covid. These funds will enable us to support up to 24 programs with grants of \$10,000 each.

In addition, Dallas Afterschool hosted a meetand-greet event with **Stephanie S. Elizalde**, **Ed.D.**, DISD Superintendent of Schools. This event offered our partners the opportunity to learn first-hand about her commitment to the sector and to children in Dallas.

reimagining out-of-school time it takes a village

Dallas Afterschool hosted our first-ever regional conference in May of 2023. Hundreds attended the two-day professional development event, which kicked off with featured speaker, author, and thought leader Dr. Froswa' Booker-Drew and the CEO of the National Afterschool Association Gina Warner.

Day two of the conference featured a panel with Enrique Garcia, Healthy Kids Initiative at United Way of El Paso County, Tiffany Huitt, Chief of School Leadership at Dallas ISD, Cathy Lee, Director of Education and Career Success at United Way of Metropolitan Dallas, and Errika Flood-Moultrie, CEO & Principal at ConnectThree.



IMPROVING PROGRAMS Helping Them Thrive

As an intermediary and convener of the sector, one of the most important things Dallas Afterschool provides is professional development for childcare programs and their staff. Both direct service personnel and leadership staff from area programs visit our local training center several times per semester to attend over 40 different courses, ranging from Parent & Community Engagement to Putting Data to Use for Your Program to Emotional Intelligence and Building Students' Self and Social Awareness. We also have a number of trainings online and on-demand to supplement our faceto-face training courses and to ensure all staff at our partner sites have access to our learning resources.

What does it look like to partner with Dallas Afterschool?

At the beginning of each academic year, our partners and prospective partners submit written agreements outlining the services they would like to receive from Dallas Afterschool. In addition to trainings, these services include one-on-one coaching, quality and safety assessments, mental health and wellness curriculum and assessments, literacy tutoring, STEM activities, virtual reality kits, and more.



Next, each partner receives a safety and quality assessment in the fall semester by an independent assessor and is assigned a dedicated Partnership Coach. Once assessed, our coaches and partners co-develop Continuous Improvement Plans that help sites master any of the 72 elements identified for improvement. Our coaches then work with direct service professionals and leaders to address and support the unique needs of each organization and site.



Dallas Afterschool also hosts an annual **Resource Giveaway** to provide partners and sites with a variety of safety and academic supplies and materials for the classroom.


